# What is Positive Behaviour Intervention Support (PBIS)?

Positive Behaviour Intervention Support (PBIS) is a whole school framework which helps schools to create positive learning environments. The approach is evidence-based for supporting situations where there is challenging behaviour. It is a proactive approach and focuses on teaching all students on the agreed expected behaviours and pro-social skills rather than reacting to inappropriate behaviour, creating an enriched environment for learning and wellbeing.

St Martin's School Values; defined by the community, guide the behaviour of everyone in our school; staff, students, families and other community members. This is achieved through our proactive systems that define, teach and support appropriate student behaviour. At St Martin's, we strive to show Respect, Responsibility, Integrity and Kindness in our daily interactions and learning.

# How does PBIS work at St Martin's Catholic Primary School?

There is a dedicated PBIS leadership team in the school which consists of leadership, classroom teachers, ESOs and OSHC leaders. Alongside the PBIS team, all staff at St Martin's are committed to working together for the successful implementation of PBIS.

A behaviour matrix articulates what the School Values and expectations look like in everyday school life in various areas of the site. The behaviour matrix is displayed in classrooms throughout the school. Procedure posters are also clearly displayed, to remind everyone of the expectations. Students are explicitly taught the School Values and expectations and are acknowledged when they demonstrate those School Values.

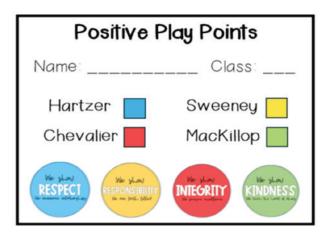
# How does our acknowledgement system work?

Our acknowledgment system works using positive feedback to students. Our classes use various ways of acknowledging expected behaviour; Dojos, reward charts, tokens, raffle tickets or class money.

Teachers collaborate with their students on classroom agreements that align with the St Martin's School Values of Respect, Responsibility, Integrity and Kindness at the beginning of each school year. These agreements are revisited at various times throughout the year.

When students are seen demonstrating the School Values and expectations from the class agreements and school matrix, they are given positive rewards. Consistency in recognising positive behaviours enables these behaviours to become an integral part of our school culture.

# Positive Play Points



Our Positive Play Points system is used during playtimes. Students can earn points for their sports team to win a reward, such as wearing their coloured sports team top or celebration play.

Teachers and ESO staff acknowledge our School Values of Respect, Responsibility, Integrity and Kindness out in play areas by giving the student a Positive Play Point slip. Students fill in their name, class and sports team. These are then collected and counted by the Student Voice leaders.

At each Awards Assembly, two or three students are drawn from the Positive Play Point Jar, and they win a canteen voucher. Points are tallied for each team and the winning team at the end of each term gets a reward. The winning team at the end of the year wins the Positive Play Point trophy.

# What is a PBIS matrix?

A behaviour matrix is a table that breaks down and articulates expected behaviours in various areas of the school environment. The behaviour matrix is displayed in classrooms throughout the school which helps the school community to establish a common language and identify gaols for behaviour.

## PBIS Procedure Posters

Procedures break down rules and expectations into teachable steps. When procedures are taught to fluency, they help students form routines so that they can efficiently and smoothly accomplish tasks with independence.

PBIS procedure posters are displayed throughout the school environment to identify actions, and behaviours that are expected in specific areas and make them routines. These are aligned with our School Values of Respect, Responsibility, Integrity and Kindness.

It is important to know how to behave in different areas of the school so we can all be safe, happy and good learners.

## Going to the Kiss & Drop After School



#### Rules/Expectations



We use voice level 3. (Low Flow) We talk kindly to the people we are walking to the Kiss & Drop with We say 'hello' to the teacher on duty and use their name.



We walk straight to Kiss & Drop from our classroom. We wait until the car we are getting into has stopped safely before we get into it. We stay near our bag.



We wait patiently for our ride. We chat kindly to others while we wait.



We watch out for others using the path and move out

of their way.
We offer help to others.
We greet the person who is picking us up with a smile on our face.

## Entering the Classroom as a Visitor



#### Rules/Expectations



We use voice level 2 (Spy Talk) We knock on the classroom door and wait to be welcomed inside We use our manners when speaking with the teacher or



We walk to the classroom and walk back out.



We deliver the message and then immediately return to our

own classroom.
We don't read messages unless asked by an adult.



We say hello to the teacher when we walk in We thank the teacher when we leave.



# Eating Time



#### Rules/Expectations



We use voice level 2 (Spy Talk)
We sit in our class's designated area until the bell rings.



When we have finished eating, we put our lunch boxes in our class's designated area.
We put all rubbish in the correct bins



We only eat our own food We keep any sports equipment on the floor next to us, only using it during play time.



We talk to the people next to us while we wait for the play

# Using the 5Ls



(Listening ears, Jegs still, Jips closed, eyes Jooking, hands in Jap)

## Rules/Expectations



We use voice level I. (Ninia Mode) We sit/stand with our bodies still We only talk when invited We give eye contact.



We own our behaviours and our choices



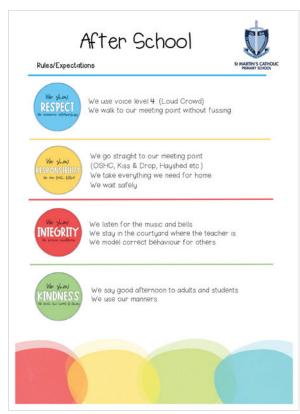
We respond to the attention grabber We actively listen to the person talking.

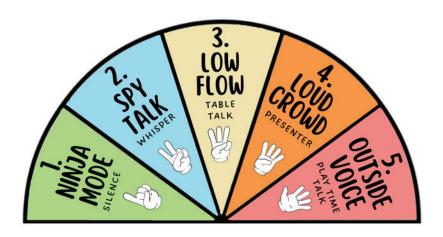






# Noise Level Chart

# Behaviour Response Flow Chart

At St Martin's, we are committed to fostering Respect, Responsibility, Integrity and Kindness in a safe environment. Using PBIS and Restorative Practices, our Behaviour Response Flow Chart helps students understand that they are accountable for their behaviour errors and provides clear consequences and opportunities to restore and relearn appropriate behaviours, ensuring they are ready to participate in learning.

#### Low Level Behaviours

- Off-task

#### Student response...

If a student has learnt from the behaviour error, they can return to class or play after a restorative reflection which may include other students or staff to ensure relationships are repaired



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If a student has learnt from the behaviour error, they can return to class or play after a re-entry meeting with parents and leadership using restorative conversation ensuring relationships are repaired.



SACCS 2019 Building Respectful Relationships: Student Suspension and Cancelling Enrolment Procedure may be invoked after repeated high level or serious incidents

In cases of conflict students are required to participate in a restorative conversation before returning to class or play. If a student chooses not to participate then they will spend time in the office with a leadership member

# Restorative Practice Student Reflection Sheet

In alignment with our School Values of Respect, Responsibility, Integrity, and Kindness, students are encouraged to reflect on low and mid-level behaviours using the Restorative Practice Student Reflection Sheet. This restorative approach supports students in taking personal responsibility for their actions, considering the impact on others, and actively seeking ways to repair and restore relationships.

By engaging in this process, students not only develop self-awareness but also cultivate empathy and accountability. They are given the opportunity to reflect on how their choices affect the broader school community and explore constructive ways to make amends. This practice encourages students to demonstrate a readiness to learn and grow, fostering a positive, inclusive, and supportive learning environment for all.
